David Hume (1711 – 1776) "Beauty is no quality in things themselves"

Immanuel Kant (1724 – 1804)

"The judgement of taste is therefore not a judgement of cognition...no other than subjective"

#### **CONTEMPORARY AESTHETICS**

Rejection of Tradition

An attempt to unlearn naturalized prejudice through the elimination of a standard

Intersectionality

Feminist, Black Aesthetics, Disability, Queer, Performance, etc.

Worth and Value Fluid concept that varies from object to object
